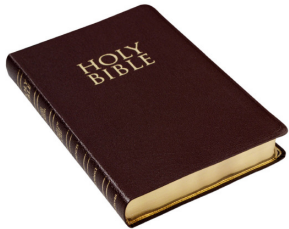

Music and Worship

On Sunday, May 22, we will be offering worship services highlighting the role of music in worship. In anticipation of this event, I want to take an opportunity to start the discussion about why we focus so much of our Sunday services on music. Throughout my time in music ministry, both at Newtown Presbyterian and in prior congregations I've served, I've had many discussions about music in worship. Most frequently, those discussions are centered around the hymns we sing. Here is just a little bit of information on the hymns of our church and why we sing.

The most common concern I've heard from many congregations over the years is "Why do we have to sing that song...I didn't know how to sing it". I have several answers for this question. First, each hymn is selected based on its text to work with the scripture of the day. Familiarity with the tune is important but secondary to the text. Second, all of our songs and hymns were new to you at one point. There are many beautiful tunes and inspiring texts that we should be singing that will be new to you or someone else in the service. If the music is unfamiliar to you, just do your best but keep in mind the text is central, not beautiful singing.

The second most frequent question I get is regarding the role of the organist in the presentation of hymns. You may have noticed that our own organist doesn't always play the music exactly as it's printed on the page. His job, as your accompanist, is to use the instrument to highlight the text of the hymn (again, it all comes back to the text). There are several ways to accomplish this; he can use different registration (sounds) of the organ, he can change the volume (dynamic) of the organ, and he can offer different harmonizations to the hymn tune. All of these are to accomplish the same goal; to help lead you to the meaning behind the words. True, you may not always be able to sing harmony as printed in the hymnal (I have some alto friends who are very discouraged by this), but if you're paying attention to the text and listening to the sometimes unfamiliar harmony, you might have a better connection to the meaning of the text.

A few weeks ago we sang a hymn that was new to many in the congregation: Hymn #419 "How Clear is Our Vocation, Lord". Dan's presentation of this hymn still stands out in my mind as being particularly appropriate. The first verse is printed: "How clear is our vocation, Lord, when once we heed Your call; To live according to Your word, and daily learn, refreshed, restored, that You are Lord of all...". In the beginning of the second line of music "To live according to your word" he began a gradual crescendo that led to the text "that You are Lord of all". I have to be honest and admit that I wasn't particularly paying attention to what I was singing when we started the hymn. My mind sometimes wonders to unimportant things like my grocery list or the fact that I keep putting off giving the dog a bath, but in this case, the organ got my attention. I realized that there was a change taking place, a very smooth, very gradual crescendo in the organ was taking me somewhere. I quickly realized that Dan was leading us to the text "that You are Lord of All". Dan's attentiveness to the text of that hymn not only brought my mind back into the room where I should have been focused in the first place but also helped me understand what this music was about; all over the course of 13 seconds.

I believe that this type of "ah ha" moments can happen here every Sunday. We are fortunate to have an organist who understands how to highlight the text in this way, but the rest of the work is on us. With that in mind I offer one final suggestion; for the next month, as you enter worship and get settled into your seat and are waiting for the service to begin, take a few minutes and read the hymn texts for the day. My belief is that if you make a connection with the text *before* the time comes to sing it, you may have an even deeper appreciation and understanding of what we are singing and how it fits into our worship.

A Flying Solo Moment

Getting married is one of the biggest decisions two people will make. You look on your future with great expectation and joy. You make a promise to each other. The decision to divorce is often like stepping off a cliff into the unknown. It is associated with feelings of hurt, betrayal, anger and resentment.

Cathy Meyers, divorce coach and contributor to About.com – Guide to Divorce Support, lists "Four Valid Reasons for Divorce". These are:

1. Physical or Emotional Abuse – "For your own safety and that of your children you need to leave".
2. Infidelity – "Infidelity is much like domestic abuse, it is a behavior that will repeat itself".
3. Economic Irresponsibility – "...do you allow someone else's problem to bury you in debt ...?"
4. Drug or Alcohol Addiction – "You can't change an addict." They will only change if and when they choose.

I definitely agree with Meyers' #1 reason. There is no excuse for the abuse of one person by another. The other three seem to me to have a bit more latitude than Meyers offers. Marriages have successfully survived affairs. Individuals have worked a recovery program and remain substance free. Irresponsible spending can be a symptom or an addiction. It is open to treatment and change.

Meyers separates the above 4 reasons from other marital problems "that have solutions but the parties to the marriage lacked the skills to solve these problems". They are disagreements, irritants and changes experienced by most married couples. She states "there is no true way to gauge whether the problems in your marriage are insurmountable. Your commitment to the marriage and your spouse determines how much you are willing to put up with and how hard you are willing to work on

your marriage". On this point, I do agree. Start with the guidance and support of our Pastors. Communicating with your spouse is essential for change.

If you or someone important to you needs support due to separation or divorce, Flying Solo meets Wednesdays from 7:30 – 9:00 p.m. in room 211. Please join us.

A Special Flying Solo Presentation

Doing So Much With So Little

During our two weeks in Zambia, the Philadelphia Presbytery travelers had the opportunity to visit, either singly or as a group, over thirty Presbyterian congregations. While the physical structures varied significantly, from churches with dirt floors and wood slab walls, to churches with partial or no roofs, to solid cinderblock and tin roofed sanctuaries, the works, the dedication, and the deeds of the congregations, and their love and enthusiasm for the risen Lord did not. From time to time we will highlight some of these churches.

Mtendere Presbyterian Church

Synod of Zambia

Uniting Presbyterian Church in Southern Africa

Established as a preaching station in the early 1970s, the Mtendere Presbyterian Church was constituted as a full congregation in 1995. The church is situated in the Mtendere compound, a low income area of 300,000, on the eastern side of Lusaka, 10 kilometers from the town center. The church boasts a communicant membership of 368 with 43 elders, and a Sunday school program with 60 children (and just 3 teachers!). The church maintains a women's fellowship with 170 members, a men's Christian guild of 63 members and a youth fellowship of 130.

In addition to a full schedule of worship services, Bible study, fellowship groups, and board meetings, the church, mainly through the women's fellowship, visits the sick in the community and watches over 21 widows and widowers in the congregation. The women's fellowship also currently provides home-based care for 12 HIV/AIDS patients. The group bathes the patients, cleans their homes, and provides food and other help on a regular basis.

Mtendere Presbyterian further runs a mission school with 280 students and a staff of 13. One hundred of those students are orphans or vulnerable children that are supported by the church in the provision of education and supplemental meals.

Mtendere PC is looking to build a manse for their pastor and a church building for their Kalingalinga preaching station, to increase their ability to support orphans and vulnerable children, and to further their outreach to HIV/AIDS patients.

Five from Presbytery To Attend Bethlehem Sabeel Conference

Five people from the Presbytery of Philadelphia will attend the 8th International Sabeel Conference in Bethlehem on February 23-28. Four of them are first-time travelers to the region who will benefit in varying amounts from the Paul A. Hopkins Education Travel Fund. All have opted to participate in a three-day post-conference tour to Galilee, Jericho, the Dead Sea, and Jerusalem.

Those making their first visit to the Holy Land are Roland Chandler, an elder in the Oak Lane Church; Ralph Folcarelli, an elder at Gwynedd Square; Pamela McShane, pastor of Princeton and Chambers Memorial Churches; and **A.J. Velichko**, a 24-year-old college student and member of the Newtown Church. Accompanying them will be Don Maclay, member at Swarthmore and co-moderator of the Presbytery Peacemaking Committee.

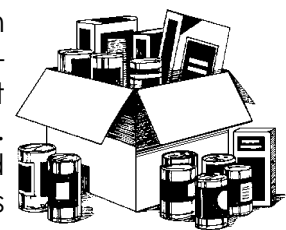
Sabeel is an ecumenical, liberation theology center based in Jerusalem. It seeks to make the Gospel contextually relevant to Palestinians seeking to free themselves from Israeli military occupation in the West Bank and Gaza and from inequality in the state of Israel. In Arabic, Sabeel means "The Way" and also a "Spring of Water." Sabeel strives to develop a spirituality based on justice, peace, nonviolence liberation, and reconciliation for the different national and faith communities. It also works to promote a more accurate international awareness regarding the identity, presence, and witness of Palestinian Christians.

The theme of the conference, which is being held at the Bethlehem Hotel, is "Challenging Empire: God, Faithfulness, and Resistance." Among the local and interna-

tional theologians leading the conference will be Naim Ateek, Director of the Sabeel Ecumenical Liberation Theology Center in Jerusalem. Opening worship will be at the Wall, later worship at Gethsemane, and closing communion will be in Bethlehem. On-site visits during the conference will also include Hebron, the Old City of Jerusalem, Bethlehem, refugee camps, checkpoints, Palestinian villages, and Sheikh Jarrah. The Hopkins Fund was established by the peacemaking committee in 2006 to honor Paul A. Hopkins (1916-2010) who served the Presbyterian Church (USA) as coordinator for mission in the Middle East from 1980 until his retirement in 1985.

Under the Deacon's Bench

One of the lesser known programs of the Deacons is to provide what we call Special Meals. We offer home-cooked meals to those members of our congregation who are in need of this support--those who are ill, have just been released from the hospital or are facing some other difficult time. The Deacons are usually called upon to do this for just a short period of time, until the family is a little more back on their feet, but we will help as long as needed. I've had the pleasure of delivering some of these meals myself, and it is gratifying to see that by just providing a few dinners, we can lift a little of the burden during a time when the family already has their hands full. If you know of someone who could use some of this care, please let Blake or Wonjae know, and they will pass the word to us.
