The Pastor’s Pen

*“For everything God created is good, and nothing is
to be rejected if it is received with thanksgiving”*

1 Timothy 4:4

The apostle Paul wrote a letter or two in his later years to a young man named Timothy who was a fellow preacher and was much younger than Paul. This mentoring relationship between Paul and Timothy gives us a rare glimpse into the kind of instruction that a young man might receive from an older veteran like Paul. These letters contain advice (*have nothing to do with godless myths and old wives’ tales; rather, train yourself to be godly.*) and instruction (*command and teach these things. Don’t let anyone look down on you because you are young*) and often encouragement, as we read here in verse 4:4.

It’s a great message for the season of Thanksgiving - a message of giving thanks for everything that God created. But note that the only way to live this kind of a thankful life is to actively receive all things with thanksgiving. It doesn’t suggest that everything in this world is easy to give thanks for, but rather that if you make a point to receive even rejected things with a thanksgiving attitude, everything will be received as good.

November is always a month for me that conjures up images of turkey feasts, backyard touch football games, and musical harmony with the whole family joining in to sing. I can’t really say that all of my childhood years are remembered with such Norman Rockwell images, but Thanksgiving.....that is a memory that I grow fonder of as the years pass by.

So, whether I will be sitting at a great feast with scads of relatives surrounding me, or whether I will be sitting at a small table with a meager meal and just my closest family, I intend to receive the gifts of this world, as difficult as they may be sometimes, with an attitude of thanksgiving. Thanks be to God.

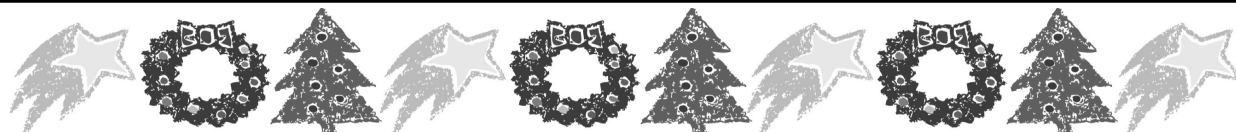
Communion Servers

Christian Education-Jr. High Sunday School

Good ol' Martin Luther and his 95 Thesis! Because of him the Protestant church exists today. That was the subject of study for the month of September. At my first inquiry with my new students on Rally Day, upon asking if they knew what it meant to be "Presbyterian" or to be "protestant," I received empty stares with no response. "Right!" I thought to myself, "It's time for a lesson in good old Presbyterian Church History!"

And so we did. With great excitement, I jumped right in and went over key words for them to be familiar with: terms such as indulgences, penance, righteous, schism, relics, heretic, and inquisition. After a brief lesson on Luther's biography, we really focused on the purpose of his 95 Thesis; these Thesis were written to display his unhappiness with the Church's sale of indulgences, and this eventually gave birth to Protestantism. Luther was concerned with the well-being of the Catholic Church and its policy of granting forgiveness through indulgence rather than penance. He illustrated the spiritual, material, and psychological truths behind abuses in the practice of buying and selling indulgences; his purpose was to uphold the truth, for the cause of Christ. For the second part of this lesson, we watched excerpts from the film "Luther" (2003), starring Joseph Fiennes.

Given the plethora of scripture we could have used for study support, I had to narrow it down to a few that I thought were most meaningful and substantiated the weight of the 95 Thesis; the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:1-11), the Parable of the Rich Man (Mark 10:17-31), Jews and Gentiles are saved by Faith (Galatians 2:15-16), the Nature of Christian Freedom (Galatians 5:1-6), and Proverbs 31:8-9.

In addition to the church history lesson, we also talked about the Apostle's Creed, why we, as Presbyterians, recite it, and what it means.

As part of our weekly curriculum, we will recite the creed together. By the end of the year, they should, I repeat, THEY SHOULD, know it by heart.

Christian Education

Most of the children in Grades 2 through 6 look forward to coming to the Games rotation. For the first Unit, we learned about the "Great Escape" of the Israelites from Egypt. We thank the several youth who helped each Sunday by being leaders in the game. There were 6 stations on their long journey. First, Moses parted the waters of the Red Sea so they could get away from the Egyptians. Then, they stopped and praised God with music and Miriam's song. God provided Manna when they were hungry and Moses was able to get water from a rock when God provided for their thirst. Moses left the group to get the 10 Commandments from God. The Israelites grew restless and afraid. So Aaron collected their gold jewelry and made a golden calf. When Moses came down the mountain and found them worshipping the calf he was so angry that he threw down the tablets and broke them. (Each child collected a piece of the tablets.) Randy Cook, our teacher for this unit, then gathered the children together and they discussed what had happened along their journey. They took home a bag of souvenirs and a paper to explain this to their family.

The next Unit will be focused on the Twenty-third Psalm. Each rotation will take place in a specific car of a train. Games will take place in the Baggage car. They will learn how to give their "personal baggage" to God. He will help them by taking the load from their shoulders. Our thanks to Linda Brennan for teaching this unit and to Kevin for being the "Grim Baggage Worker".

Are You Called To Service?

A hymn from the 20th century quotes Isaiah, asking "Is it I, Lord?" Its refrain refers to Isaiah's response, "Here am I, Lord, send me." Stephen Ministry is one of those special callings. It is a call to receive special training to equip you to walk with another Christian who is going through one of life's challenges.

On Sunday, November 6 from 10:15 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., the Stephen Ministry Leaders will be holding an informational meeting in Room 208. This will be an opportunity to learn more about becoming a Stephen Minister and begin your prayerful process of determining whether you are being called to this service.

As we met Stephen Ministers from all over North America, we discovered that many churches were equally represented by men and women in this ministry. They report many benefits they have received from providing this service. They have found that it enhanced their vocational, personal and spiritual lives.

Retired NFL coach Bill Arnsparger described his relationship with his care receiver: "I know I can't just write him a prescription to make him feel better. My job is to listen and to care. God takes care of the rest. Each opportunity to care is a new challenge, a new experience, just as each game is."

The informational meeting will be a first step in the process of becoming a Stephen Minister. Interviews with Stephen Leaders will take place after a written application is completed. 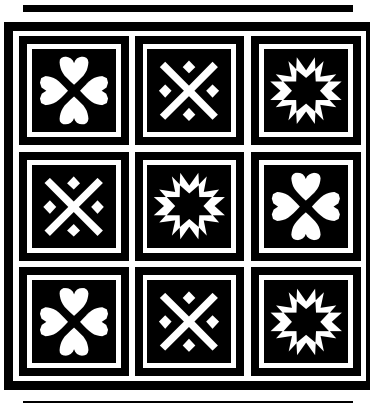
Quilt Show
