The Pastor’s Pen

In the past two years, I have been honored to serve as the Vice Moderator and then the Moderator of the Presbytery of Philadelphia. Along with the honor has come a deep commitment to the principles of a connected church and the beauty of democracy at work. Democracy is not easy. It is messy and time-consuming and often leaves turmoil in its wake – but it is the best way for a church to operate here on earth. We are a community and everyone should have a voice and a vote.

The month of January brings two shining examples of this form of democracy at work as our church hosts an ANNUAL MEETING on Sunday, January 22nd and an ALL-CHURCH TOWN MEETING on Sunday, January 29th.

The Annual Meeting is our yearly attempt at democracy in the church. We come together in Ettenger Hall in lieu of the 10:45 worship service and share a light brunch followed by a meeting to hear about the budget, elect officers, and discuss any important business that the whole body needs to address. You should come! Everyone has a chance to speak their mind and all members have a vote.

This January, we are also hosting an All-Church Town Meeting to discuss and clarify two issues that have arisen in our national Presbyterian Church. First, the New Form of Government (NFog) was passed by the General Assembly of our church and went into effect in July of 2011. It shortens and simplifies the Book of Order (our constitution) and returns a great deal of the authority in governing the church to local Sessions and Presbyteries.

Second, one of the provisions of the NFog is a section labeled “10a” which removes the requirement of ordained officers and clergy in the church to live in singleness in chastity or in a marriage relationship between a man and a woman. It offers instead that each ordaining body of the Session or the Presbytery should consider the qualifications of the person and be guided by the Holy Spirit. It has raised some interesting controversy and discussion. (Read the essay written by Elder Laurie Skoroda elsewhere in this Newsletter)

I hope you will plan to be a part of both of these events in January. Truly, democracy at work in the church of Jesus Christ.

Session Notes

The Session of the church met on Tuesday, December 6, 2011 at 7:30 P.M. in Ettenger Hall. The meeting was opened with a convening prayer by **Elder Kathy Denlinger** and a unison reading from Ephesians 1:15-19.

- **The Order of the Day** was the presentation of proposed budget requests from the second half of the boards and committees of the church. The Session reviewed the budget process and received the proposed budgets from this group of committees.
- The Session had a discussion concerning the budget for 2012 and the music programs of the church as opinions varied about expanding the program or keeping it where it is.
- The **Membership Committee** presented an idea about using name tags for morning worship to encourage us to greet each other. After much discussion, it was decided that a pilot program using paper name tags will be offered and then the idea will be evaluated to determine if more permanent tags should be purchased.
- The Session had a discussion concerning the deficit left in the two youth mission trips from last summer and how they will be addressed going forward.

The Session was adjourned with prayer for those in need by **Elder Denlinger**.

Monday Night Bible Study

A new Bible Study will start Monday night, January 9. The goal will be to study the basic Christian doctrines, but always with the understanding that doctrine is a wonderful servant and a horrible master. What does that mean for a Bible Study?

First, Jesus encourages us to “bind and loose”, which is the technical term rabbis used for forbidding or allowing scriptural interpretations. A rabbi’s interpretation of how to live the Torah, was called the rabbi’s yoke. One rabbi even said his “yoke was easy” (Matthew 11:30). If the rabbi thought the student had totally missed the point of the text, he would say “you have abolished the Torah”. The Bible Study should include some historical perspective.

Second, the binding and loosing was done in community, to ensure a person never went too far in a twisted interpretation. Thus, Jesus said, “where two or three come together in my name, there I am with them” (Matthew 18:20). The Bible Study must include lots of questions and challenges.

And third, the Bible Study must maintain an intricate balance of conviction and humility, which is made very clear to Moses when he asked for God’s name, “I will remove my hand and you will see my back” (Exodus 33:23). That is to say, “Not who I am, but where I just was”. As the psalmist said, “His understanding has no limit” (Psalm 147:5). Jesus also did not have much patience with those who thought they had it all figured out (Matthew 25:41).

So that’s the way the Bible Study will work: some challenging videos, some text and commentary on the church’s basic doctrines, many references to biblical passages and to Christian thinkers, and lots of discussion on how the life that Jesus offers can gradually become our lives. After all is said and done, Christianity is more about the experience we are actually having. All our study and discussion and doctrines about God help us put words to realities that are beyond words. Doctrine is a wonderful servant and a horrible master.

Paul’s instruction to the leaders of the early Christian Church at Antioch was to select “elders and deacons” to conduct the church’s business. Because the founders of the Presbyterian denomination did just that, it can be said that from a governance point of view Presbyterian churches operate “bottom-up”, beginning with the congregation, as opposed to “top down”, church directives emanating from one central church leader.

The Annual Congregational Meeting provides church members the opportunity to personally receive reports from and offer suggestions to Elders, deacons, trustees, and church committee members concerning the coming year’s church program.

As is the case with any other governmental meeting, the organization’s strength and relevance grows in direct proportion to the number of members who participate.

So join your fellow congregation members for breakfast in Ettenger Hall at 10:15 a.m., Sunday, January 22, 2012 (nursery care will be provided) at the Annual Congregation Meeting and help to weave the 2012 Newtown Presbyterian Church “fabric of faith”.

New Form of Government (NFOG's 10a)

Last month I saw the movie *The Help*, based on the book by the same name. It had quite an effect on me. Set in the 60's – this wasn't something that happened “before my time” – this was MY history. I can remember the first African-American person I ever met. It was about 1963, and he was a guest at our house. You have to understand, I grew up in NW Washington State and we were not a diverse population by any stretch of the imagination. My dad bought/sold heavy equipment. Our guest was the truck driver who brought a load to my dad. He got in late and I guess my dad could tell he wasn't going to be able to afford a motel, so he stayed with us. I was the youngest at the time; I had 3 older brothers and an older sister. I remember sitting on his lap, my brothers playing football with him in the yard and his eating dinner with us. I was three, and as my parents shared later – I didn't ask one question about the color of his skin; I was an attention hog and he was happy to give it! I had no idea at the time what that said about my parents. We often called my dad our own Archie Bunker; but, in reality, my dad was nothing like him. Sure he was loud and opinionated, but not in a racist or judgmental way. I wish I could tell my dad today how proud I am of him for this, but I think he knows....

Recently, the Presbyterian Church passed **resolution 10a**. What **10a** does is take away the language that prohibited the ordination of clergy who are gay or lesbian – that's it. It doesn't promote or even mention gays or lesbians. The change is really not a change except that the Book of Order is now explicit that sessions and presbyteries will choose their pastors according to their gifts and faith.

What's my point? We live in New Hope – often referred to as the “Gay Capital” of the North East. Because of this, we have neighbors and wonderful friends who are gay, and our kids have friends with two mothers or two fathers. As a result, we explained about gays and lesbians to them earlier than most. Now, it's really a non-issue for them. Sure, they are inundated by social stereotypes, but I am very proud of how they have accepted it and don't think of it as sinful or wrong. Much like my parents taught me tolerance and acceptance, I strive to do the same for my children.

I have a dream, much like Martin Luther King did in 1963, that in my lifetime, we will look back at the controversy surrounding gays and lesbians- whether it be getting married, adopting children or becoming clergy- just as we do the treatment of African American's, and even women, earlier in our nation's history. I believe being gay is no different – you don't get to choose your race, your gender, or your sexual orientation. God does that. I pray we accept them for who they are as people and judge them on their deed's and their faith, just like everyone else.
