The Pastor’s Pen

John 3:16

16 ‘For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

As 2012 moves on into February, I see on the calendar two dates of note: Valentine’s Day and Ash Wednesday. Those two occasions within a week of each other make me wince a bit, contrasting each other so. Valentine’s Day, for me at least, is most enjoyably spent tasting delicious morsels of chocolate and hearing about everyone’s plans ranging from romantic getaways to dinners to we both have dentist appointments. Contrast those plans to Ash Wednesday which begins the Lenten season with a sobering service that challenges us to turn away from sin and directs us toward a deeper relationship with God. The ashes remind some of the Old Testament practices of heaping ashes on one’s head and serve as a sign to others who see us that we are sinners in need of saving.

Even the best of us do not circumvent the scriptural declaration, “... since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.” All of us, everyone, no one is exempt, we are together this “all.” We can try to point fingers at each other, we can try to prioritize sinners and sins but the fact remains that all have sinned, you, me, and everyone. Does this understanding, the theological reality that we are all in this together, help us? Jesus died on the cross for us and for our salvation so that we can be in relationship with one another and with God. We can even claim this as the ultimate act of love, not the Valentine-y love between couples but love so great that it calls forth a new life in us and claims us to God’s service.

As I experience Valentine’s Day and Ash Wednesday within a week of each other, I guess it is all about love. I wish you love, God’s love, so big and generous and expectant that it not only surprises us but it changes us.

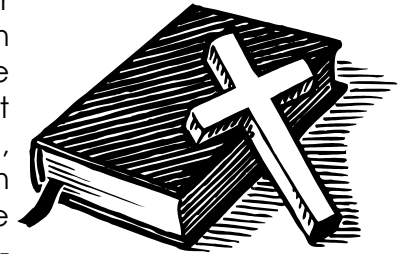

Session Notes

The session of the Newtown Presbyterian Church met on Tuesday, January 10, 2012, and was called to order by a prayer from **Elder Betsy Kruse** and a unison reading from James 1.

- The **Order of the Day** was a discussion and approval of the 2012 unified budget for presentation at the Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting will be held on Sunday, January 22, at 10:15 a.m. in Ettenger Hall. A light breakfast will be served by the Congregational Life Committee followed by the business of the congregation and the corporation.
- Plans for the **Town Meeting** to be held on Sunday, January 29 were discussed. The meeting will use a short video to educate those present about the New Form of Government and the new Standards for Ordination. The rest of the meeting will be for questions and discussion.
- **Elder Archie Foor** announced the plans for the next new members class to be held on Saturday, January 21 at 8:30 a.m.
- The **Session** voted to schedule fundraising events for the Historic Church: Chili Luncheon, Spaghetti Dinner, Strawberry Festival and Soup Sale.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer by **Pastor Wonjae Choi**.

Christian fellowship. It is a beautiful thing, where many come together sharing similar interests, ideals, or experiences by reason of religion. Interpersonal relationships are so crucial for the development of our faith to keep it alive and growing, and when we deprive ourselves of that exposure to other Christians, our spiritual fervor begins to deplete. For this reason, there is no other substitute for going to church and worshiping with others of the same faith.

As a teacher of the 7th and 8th grade class, I find it beautiful to watch the teens come in to class, chatting away, making jokes (typically followed by much laughter), and settling in for our lesson. They wait patiently for the moment when I give them permission to dig into their selection of Dunkin Donuts, and then all sit chewing away as I introduce the topic of the morning.

I can see that we have grown as a class at this point in the year. In the beginning, the students would answer sheepishly when called upon, and very rarely would they openly pose a question or make suggestions. Now I see students shouting out answers, making suggestions, 10 raising their hands at once, and it goes without saying there is always a wise crack (to be expected). All feel comfortable with one another in their thoughts and questions about our faith. I feel as if our "studies" in class have evolved into a strong fellowship with one another. It's a beautiful thing.

In the next couple of months, we are going to be looking at topics such as creed, discipleship, and tough theological questions, given that Confirmation for the 8th graders has started. It is my hope that as we study God's word, their understanding of our Lord's teachings become more concrete, and their faith and relationship with Christ will blossom and grow as a by-product.

I have a dynamic group of students this year, each and every one of them beautiful in their own way. I wish to thank each and every parent for making Sunday worship a priority. My lessons seem to have taken on a new path. With the students now as vocally active as they are, they really make the lesson grow and flourish in many ways that I do not, and cannot plan for. I love it. I love teaching this class. I love God's children. This, my friends, is a beautiful thing.

A Flying Solo Moment

Neal King, LCSW, recently offered a presentation entitled "How to Keep Stress From Invading Your Body (and Ruining Your Life)". Neal is a social worker, therapist and motivational speaker. His talk was lively and entertaining. He emphatically views stress as a killer, killing ones health, relationships, even freedom – a stress reaction can have the consequence of jail. Yet Neal wanted us to remember that stress is temporary, even though we tend to turn it into something permanent. He describes it as "choosing to get beat up by stress".

In negotiating these feelings, Neal tells us to, first, recognize the stress. He recommended writing down each feeling of stress for a few days. Second, realize that getting upset is natural. Third, it is important to move on to thinking. "I wonder what my solution will be?" – is the phrase he finds useful to employ. It is the thinking part of our brain, the cerebral cortex, which will stop the stress and anxiety. This is the area of logic, imagination and thought. We need to handle the amygdala, the primitive part of our brain where we experience fear. The amygdala produces the flight, fright or freeze reaction. To survive the stress, we must stop simply feeling it and start thinking. We can prepare for challenging moments. We know what will be stressful, traffic jams happen, right? Neal asks us – "Why did you put yourself in that situation?"

We carry our past reactions with us but we aren't stuck with them. We can learn from our frustrations. If they no longer work we can discard them. Our ancestors needed those primitive responses to survive attacks by wild animals and warring tribes. Now our stress is "I can't pay this bill". Try saying to yourself "My life is improving as I regain control". Neal described a relaxation technique of picturing stressful feelings rising in balloons. Thanks Neal.

Birthdays and Time

Once we reach a certain age, most of us would rather dispense with the annual ritual of our birthdays, but considering the alternative, we put up with them.

January 10 was the birthday of one of the most remarkable citizens of our globe. He was born in England in 1942 during one of that country's darkest hours. Educated at Oxford and then Cambridge, he had access to the best education England could provide but he proved to be an undistinguished student ... brilliant but unfocused and undisciplined. At this stage in his life, it did not appear likely he would live up to his God-given potential until, at the age of 21, he was diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, or ALS, more commonly known as Lou Gehrig's disease.

His diagnosis was potentially devastating. Given two years to live, he could easily have thrown in the towel and surrendered to his disease. Instead, he continued with his studies, earning a PhD from Cambridge eventually becoming the Lucasian Professor of Mathematics at Cambridge, one of the world's most prestigious academics positions and the chair formerly occupied by Sir Isaac Newton. His contributions to the field of cosmology advanced our understanding of black holes and the origins of the universe and his bestselling book, *A Brief History of Time*, made him an academic celebrity on the order of Albert Einstein. All this from a man who, according to his doctors, was supposed to be dead 47 years ago! Of course, I'm talking about Stephen Hawking, who turned 70 on January 10.

Sometimes hardship and tragedy have a way of concentrating our minds. I don't know if God played a role in the stabilization of Hawking's disease, which allowed him to accomplish so much, or even if Hawking is particularly religious. But I do believe that God gives us what we need ... not what we want ... to fulfill his plan for us in our lives. No one would have wished such a devastating disease on Stephen Hawking, and I'm sure he did not wish it on himself, but comparing his lackadaisical academic career pre-ALS to what he has since accomplished, I see God's hand at work in Stephen Hawking's life. I know we are better for having had Stephen Hawking with us for those extra 47 years.

I'll conclude with Stephen's message to us on his 70th birthday ... not theological in the least but inspirational, nonetheless:

"Look up at the stars and not down at your feet. Try to make sense of what you see and about what makes the universe exist. Be curious. And however difficult life may seem, there is always something you can do, and succeed at. It matters that you don't just give up."

Happy Birthday, Stephen ... and many more!

Historic Church Financial Requirements

In the 1960's, a Trust was established for our Historic Church. The goal of the Trust was to provide sufficient income to pay all of the ongoing operating costs of the Historic Church, and in addition, if income was sufficient, to provide funds to make capital improvements. The Trust principal can not be used. Over the years, the value of the Trust principal has increased through designated donations, bequests and investment returns. In 2011, the Trust principal grew approximately \$2,500.

At the present time, with the current interest rate environment, income from the Trust does not pay for the ongoing operating expenses of our Historic Church. Consequently, since September of last year, the Historic Church Fund is being utilized to pay for the ongoing operating expenses. This is a temporary situation – though no one knows for how long – until the interest rate environment results in Trust income sufficient to resume paying for on going Historic Church operation. The current situation puts a strain on the monies in the Historic Church Fund which comes from designated donations and clearly marked memorials to the Historic Church Fund. The largest contributions come from the Historic Church Committee fund raisers.

Over the years, the congregation has been very supportive of these fund raisers. In addition to paying for operating expenses, the fund raising events of the Committee have provided monies to do capital improvements. Two examples are the new floor structure in the Session House and the new flagstone walkway. The fund raising events also make possible the plantings, mulching, and maintenance of the gardens.

The Historic Church Committee appeals to the congregation for continued support of its fund raising events. Your support is needed in attending the events and also in providing help. At the present time, the fund raisers are paying the entire cost of operating our Historic Church.

Thank you for your support of our fund raisers, for your designated donations, and your memorial remembrances. You make it happen, and your help is both greatly needed and appreciated.
